HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL 27TH JANUARY 2024: Fragility of Freedom. Freedom means different things to different people. What is clear is that in every genocide that has taken place, those who are targeted for persecution have had their freedom restricted and removed, before many of them are murdered. This is often a subtle, slow process. There is always a set of circumstances which occur, or which are created, to build the climate in which genocide can take place and in which perpetrator regimes can remove the freedoms of those they are targeting. On HMD 2024, we can all reflect on how freedom is fragile and vulnerable to abuse. As we come together in communities around the UK, let's pledge not to take our freedoms for granted, and consider what we can do to strengthen freedoms around the world.

ST BRIGID IS ONE OF IRELAND'S THREE PATRON SAINTS, along with St Patrick and St Colmcille. In 2023, Ireland instituted

a bank holiday in honour of St Brigid, recognising the importance of her legacy. It is the first bank holiday in Ireland to be named after a woman. There is a special ecumenical service in St Brigid's Cathedral, Kildare to honour her on her feast day, 1st February, to mark the 1,500th anniversary of her death. St Brigid's Cathedral, Kildare, marks the ancient hilltop site where she founded her double monastery, for men and for women, in the year 480AD. This *Ecumenical Service of Thanksgiving* is part of the "Brigid 1500 Programme to celebrate her extraordinary life and legacy. A global invitation is being extended to individuals worldwide to take part in the "pause for peace", a minutes silence for peace at midday on St Brigid's Day, 1st February. For events from 27th January to 6th February, go to: **www.brigid1500ie** A lost chapel dedicated to St Ffraid, or Brigid, on Holy Island indicates the importance of this Irish saint to the area around Holyhead in the Middle Ages. Ffraid is the Welsh name for the saint usually known as Bridget,



Brigid or Bride, who is closely associated with Kildare in Ireland. The chapel dedicated to her on Holy Island stood in ruins on a mound on the beach at Tywyn-y-Capel in the late eighteenth century, St Ffraid was remembered in the dedication of the new church built at Trearddur Bay in 1930–2. The stone church replaced a temporary wooden church that had been re-erected twice on different sites since being put up for the first time in 1898. An image of Ffraid was included in the east window of the church that was installed in 1940. In the window she stands on a turf of grass that appears to be floating on water. A sixteenth-century poem by the Welsh poet lorwerth Fynglwyd refers to a tradition that she travelled across the sea from Ireland to Wales on a turf, arriving at the Dyfi estuary in mid-Wales. Other traditions fix her arrival at Deganwy, close to Llansantffraid Glan Conwy in north Wales, and at Tywyn-y-Capel. Ffraid holds fire in her right hand, a symbol that refers to the perpetual fire maintained by her nuns at Kildare, as attested by Gerald of Wales in the late twelfth century. The symbol of fire is used on the millennium cross set alongside the promenade at Trearddur Bay, which marks the site of the lost chapel of St Ffraid in the dunes.
