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
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For the second time in as many years the major celebration of the three Abrahamic faiths happen to coincide, an event that normally only happens once in every thirty or so years. This year the holy Month of Ramadan began in mid-March when the Christian Church was well settled into Lent and this Easter weekend is the same weekend as the Jewish feast of Passover. Easter and Passover are the same weekend more often than not, but for the two to fall in the second half of Ramadan and within days of Id al-Fitr is much less common. It is a wonderful opportunity for us of different faiths but with a common heritage to come together to celebrate our shared values of mercy and compassion, hope and renewal, and peace. This especially so when we look at the destruction and death that is being wreaked upon Christians, Muslims and Jews in the very region of the world of our common origin and countries of our shared holy sites.

At the moment hardly a day goes by when we don't hear or read in our news media of occurrences or alleged occurrences of antisemitism or anti-Judaism, of Islamophobia or of anti-Christian blasphemy; all reflect a religious hatred or intolerance and all can be criminal. When we consider our common roots in faith, and the religious practices that we hold important, this is sheer madness that we cannot as Jew or Christian or Muslim not only learn to live together but, together, be an ever greater force for good in the world in the tackling of environmental issues, natural disasters and man-made conflicts.

In response to a recent letter of Pope Francis to 'my Jewish brothers and sisters in Israel', Karma Ben Johanan a theologian of Jewish-Christian dialogue wrote: "We are ready to collaborate so that hatred and violence are eliminated and the doors are opened to true peace for all of us who live in this land: Jews, Christians, and Muslims. We join Christians in the belief that religions can be a creative force capable of opening paths that would otherwise remain closed."

More specifically, in the annual message, 'On the occasion

of the month of Ramadan and for the feast of 'Id al Fitr 1445 H. / 2024 A.D.', the Dicastery for Interreligious Dialogue sent a message of good wishes to Muslims all over the world, entitled "Christians and Muslims: Extinguish the Fire of War and Light the Candle of Peace'. In which we read: "We look to the Almighty as God of peace, the source of peace, who in a special way loves all those who devote their lives to the service of peace. Like so many things, peace is a divine gift but at the same time the fruit of human efforts, especially in preparing the conditions necessary for its establishment and preservation.

"As believers, we are also witnesses to hope, as we recalled in our 2021 Message for Ramadan: 'Christians and Muslims: Witnesses of Hope'. Hope can be symbolised by a candle, whose light radiates security and joy, whereas fire, uncontrolled, can lead to the destruction of fauna and flora, infrastructure and the loss of human lives.

"Dear Muslim brothers and sisters, let us join in extinguishing the fires of hatred, violence and war, and instead light the gentle candle of peace, drawing upon resources for peace that are present in our rich human and religious traditions."

Coming to the end of our Lenten fast and almsgiving may that hope-filled prayer for peace in the Holy Land be uppermost in our Easter celebrations as we stand in the light of the great Easter candle. We pray too for peace and reconciliation among those of different faiths, "respect the absolute value of the life of each person and his or her right to physical integrity, security and a dignified life will likewise contribute to the condemnation and rejection of war, any war and all wars."

With the assurance of my prayers and asking for yours I wish you, your families and the whole Diocese a blessed, joyous and happy Easter.

Praying with St Beuno's Outreach: 'As one friend to another ...'

In this monthly reflection, St Beuno's Outreach invites you to pray with an image and a verse of Scripture or other material.

Since 2000 the Sunday after Easter (Low Sunday) has been designated as the Feast of Divine Mercy. On this day, we are called to reflect more personally on the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, and all the blessings we have received. The focus is on God's compassion, reminding us that the risen Lord offers us love that pardons, reconciles, and opens our own hearts to love.

Divine Mercy Sunday was instituted by Pope John Paul II following the canonisation of the Polish religious sister and mystic Maria Faustina Kowolska (1905-38) in 2000. Sister Faustina, a member of the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in Krakow, experienced visions of Jesus and had conversations with him which she recorded in her diary. This earned her the title of 'Secretary of Divine Mercy'.

The painting of Divine Mercy

Sister Faustina's diary records an instruction from Jesus that she should paint the vision of him that she saw, and include the signature 'Jesus, I trust in you' with it. Though not an artist herself, Faustina was helped by her priest-confessor to commission Eugeniusz Kazimirowski of Vilnius to paint the first image of Divine Mercy in 1934. The painting was based directly on Faustina's verbal description of her vision, where Jesus appeared to her in a simple robe with red and pale rays emanating from his heart. Kazimirowski's original now hangs in the shrine of Divine Mercy in Vilnius, though it has been reproduced many times over in slightly different forms, and a version now hangs in many Catholic churches here in the UK.

This month's text from Psalm 102 (103), in praise of God's mercy and love, reflects the compassionate theme of Divine Mercy Sunday. Mary herself quotes from this psalm as she sings her 'Magnificat' to her kinswoman Elizabeth.

Take a moment to read the verses slowly and prayerfully, perhaps aloud or on your breath if you can, to fully appreciate their rhythm. Then stay with any one line or phrase that 'speaks' to you more particularly. You might like to choose this line as your own response to this psalm and repeat it at the beginning and between each stanza.

My soul, give thanks to the Lord, all my being, bless God's holy name. My soul, give thanks to the Lord and never forget all God's blessings.

The Lord is compassion and love, slow to anger and rich in mercy. The Lord will not always chide, will not be angry forever.

God does not treat us according to our sins nor repay us according to our faults. But the love of the Lord is everlasting upon those who fear the Lord.

My soul, give thanks to the Lord! Psalm 102 (103) vv. 1-2, 8-10, 17

What feelings arise in you as you read this text? In what way do these words relate to events in your own life?

Do their reassurance and comfort help you to trust in the Lord?

Maybe the psalm brings to mind times in your life where you needed and experienced the Lord's love, mercy, and compassion.

What do you want to say to him now?

Perhaps you want to assure the Lord not of your 'fear' – an Old Testament expression – but to tell him in your own words of your awe, respect and love for him. At this time when we ponder Divine Mercy, you may also like to pray for greater trust.

Speak to the Lord as one friend to another, and take time to listen to him.

The Season of Easter

Low Sunday Quasimodo Sunday Thomas Sunday The Second Sunday of Easter has a number of different names.

Since at least the 15th Century, it has been **'Low Sunday'**, possibly in contrast to the 'High' celebration of Easter, or a corruption of 'laudes'.

The opening Antiphon begins in latin; Quasi modo géniti infántes, - 'As newborn babes' (in the same way as....) In the Hunchback of Notre Dame, by Victor Hugo, the baby was found on Low Sunday, and the canon of the Cathedral named him 'Quasimodo' -some suggest because he was always as simple as a new born babe.

The Gospels tell us that it was 8 days later that the Disciples gathered in the Upper Room – that is the equivalent of our 'Sunday' -and since Thomas was now present, it has become known in the Eastern Church as 'Thomas Sunday'. The name 'White Sunday' came from the tradition that the newly baptised wore white for the 8 days after Easter. In 2000, Pope St John Paul II dedicated this Sunday as 'Divine Mercy Sunday' (see the St Beuno's Outreach on page 3)

World Day of Prayer 2024 By Fr Ebuka, msp

The atmosphere was serene and peaceful on March 1, as Eglwys Y Bugail Da Church in the picturesque town of Llanrwst, welcomed participants of this year's World Day of Prayer. World Day of Prayer is an annual event observed by millions around the globe, aimed at fostering unity, understanding, and prayerful reflection across various cultures and denominations to pray for specific global issues.

The theme for this year's World Day of Prayer was "I beg you, bear with one another in love." It emphasised the importance of faith and love despite difficulties and differences in addressing global challenges and to unite in prayer for just and harmonious solutions that would bring an end to human suffering; and the need to commit ourselves to journey with each other to achieve security and peace for all people around the world. The theme was beautifully incorporated into the prayers, hymns, and reflections throughout the event.

The programme began with a warm welcome by the parish priest Fr Ebuka, and the organisers, followed by hymns, readings and reflections on the theme. Participants engaged in heartfelt prayers for peace, justice, and reconciliation across the world. Special attention was given to Palestine, the land in which Jesus was born that is experiencing conflict and hardship, with prayers for healing and hope.

Local community leaders and representatives from various Christian denominations actively participated in the event, underlining the significance of collaboration and solidarity in addressing global issues. Their presence highlighted the importance of grassroots efforts in fostering positive change.

One of the most remarkable aspects of the event was the story of resilience, truth telling and of flourishing from three Palestinian Christian women who witness to the power of bearing together in love. Their stories illuminate the experiences of Palestinian Christians from three different generations. The symbol of an olive tree represents the three generations through its trunk, branches and leaves.

Other symbolic gestures, such as lighting candles and offering gifts, added depth and meaning to the prayers and reflections. These gestures served as tangible reminders of the participants' commitment to promoting peace, justice, and reconciliation in the world.

The World Day of Prayer at Eglwys Y Bugail Da, Church was a resounding success, bringing together individuals from various Christian denominations in a spirit of unity, prayer, and reflection. The event underscored the power of collective action and solidarity in addressing global challenges and building a more compassionate and inclusive society. As attendees dispersed, the sense of kindness, hope and inspiration lingered, serving as a catalyst for continued dialogue, collaboration, and service within the community.

WORLD DAY FOR CHILDREN

On the feast of the Immaculate Conception (8th December 2023) at the end of his Angelus Message Pope Francis said, 'And now I have the joy of announcing that the 25th and 26th of May next year (2024) we will celebrate the first World Day of Children, in Rome. The initiative, organised by the Dicastery for Culture and Education, responds to the question: 'What type of world do we want to transmit to the children who are growing up?' Like Jesus, we want to put children at the centre and take care of them.

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION

Last year you contributed £5,612.75 to the *Pontifical Collection for the Holy Land*. The money collected around the world not only supports the custody of the Holy Places that Jesus saw and were important in his life, but also assist the Christians living and operating in the Holy Land, amid the tragedies and difficulties caused by the selfishness of the powerful of the world. Over the centuries many martyrs have died so as not to see their Christian roots cut off. Their churches are an integral part of the history and culture of the East. The Christians of Iraq, Syria, Lebanon Jerusalem and Palestine turn to us and ask, 'Help us to spread the fragrance of Christ' (2 Corinthians 2:15) again in the East.

Now is your opportunity to help those who cry and those who die because of the madness of war, those who have lost their children or see them horribly mutilated or suffering extreme hunger. Your donation can support the local churches in finding new ways, opportunities for housing, work and educational and professional training so that these people can remain in the Holy Land, witness to their faith and continue their small businesses in the hope and expectation that pilgrims will return. Without these small communities the East will lose part of its soul and perhaps forever.

At the Bishop's invitation, the Missionary Congregation of The **Evangelising Sisters of Mary** (MCESM) and the **Daughters of Divine Love** (DDL) Sisters have arrived in the diocese to join the work of witnessing to the faith.

EVANGELISING SISTERS OF MARY (ESM).

Sr. Triphosa Karugara Mukindia, of the ESM arrived the diocese of Wrexham on 17th November of 2023. She is currently in Ruthin presbytery. The Missionary Congregation of The Evangelising Sisters of Mary is a Religious Institute of Pontifical Right. It was founded in 1975 in Moroto Diocese, Uganda, by two Italian Comboni Missionaries namely; Rt. Rev Bishop Sisto Mazzoldi and very Rev. Fr. John Marengoni both of happy memory. charism of the MCESM is mainly PASTORAL WORK, through primary evangelization and catechetical instructions in the Parishes, Schools and Universities. The Sisters participate actively in parish social works through helping the poor and vulnerable members of our society in hospitals, dispensaries, nursing homes and Rehabilitation centres. As of today, they have 437 professed Sisters. Currently the Sisters are in 10 countries: Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Zambia, South Africa, South Sudan, Italy, Germany, United Kingdom, United States of America and Cuba.

THE DAUGHTERS OF DIVINE LOVE CONGREGATION (DDL).

Sr. Elonna Ugochukwu, Sr. Geraldine Enemuoh, and Sr. Leona Umeh arrived in the diocese on the 6th of February. They are currently at St. Asaph Presbytery. The Daughters of Divine Love Congregation (DDL) is a religious Order of women with Pontifical rights. It was founded on 16th July 1969 at Ukpor, Anambra State - Nigeria, during the Nigeria-Biafran Civil war.

Moved by the sufferings of Biafrans, the late Bishop Godfrey Mary Paul Okoye, CSSP, of Enugu diocese, Nigeria, established the congregation to take care of the homeless, the sick and the hungry during the war. The Sisters are called to an audacious response to Divine Love Incarnate through contemplation, peaceful community living, and apostolic action manifested in selfless service to all creation. The Charism of the DDL Sisters, among others, is a generous loving response to Divine Love Incarnate. Their Motto is: Caritas Christi, Urget Nos (The Love of Christ, Urges us). The members pronounce publicly the vows of Chastity, Poverty, and Obedience. The Congregation, recognised by its BLUE VEIL, adapts their mission to the needs of their communities. The Sisters participate actively in feeding the hungry, in education, pastoral work, healthcare services and social works. They serve humanity with their gifts. The DDL mustard seed, that blossomed into a huge tree, has over 1000 Professed Sisters. The Sisters work currently in Nigeria, Gabon, Cameroon, T'Chad, Mali, Kenya, UK, Germany, Italy, Austria, Switzerland, the United States of America, Cuba, Jamaica, Haiti and France.

INTO THE FUTURE 3 - LISTENING EXERCISE

The following constitutes a first report on the six Listening Exercise meetings held around the Diocese: (Also, one further meeting specifically for the priests and deacons of the Diocese) 330 (±2%) attendees which represents approximately 10% of the Sunday Mass attendance;

75 (± 5%) attendees expressed a spoken view, opinion or suggestion;

43 written submissions of which 10 were the consequence of parish discussions and therefore were collective views, and some additional or re-statement of what had already been articulated by an individual at a meeting.

The main themes addressed at the meetings were (in no particular order):

a call for adult catechesis and formation in faith education and spirituality;

greater lay leadership and involvement;

a greater use of Services of Word and Holy Communion; more to be done for young people and the youth;

a desire to build communities and as necessary existing parish communities.

Over the coming weeks Bp Peter will work through the meeting summaries and the written submissions and try to collate a coherent record of what was heard. That will inform a reflection in which he will prepare a way forward into the future. This will

inevitably depend for its success on the human skills and material resources that are volunteered from the faithful, at least in part. In the meantime the bishop asks that parishioners continue in their individual and collective prayer, reading of Scripture, and study of the document, *The Pastoral Conversion of the Parish Community in the Service of the Evangelising Mission of the Church* to be better prepared for what changes may ensue. https://press.vatican.va/content/salastampa/en/bollettino/pubblico/2020/07/20/200720a.html

If lay leadership, as spoken of by respondents, is to develop within the Diocese, more parishioners will need to volunteer to be school governors, members of the Diocesan Commissions, members of Parish Pastoral Advisory Councils (PACs or PPACs) and Trustees.

You can volunteer by submitting your name and personal details including a brief statement of the skills, competences or qualifications that you can offer in the service of Church. These can be submitted at any time to the Diocesan Curia. Not all offers may be needed at this or any particular time, but lists will be held and volunteers should be prepared for succession as and when the time comes. This would be true too of liturgical ministers, catechists and other pastoral ministers.



DIOCESAN FINANCES

Part 2 – Central Services And Parishes



In this second consideration of the Diocesan Finances the focus will be on the Diocesan Central Services and Parish expenditure/costs, and the Annual Levies. The figures given are in each case a vignette on part of the whole accounts, given in an attempt to give explanation, they are consolidated figures from the annual financial returns submitted by Parishes and St. Winefride's Shrine. The complete picture and detail is to be found in the audited accounts as filed and to be seen on the Charity Commission website https://register-of-

These are figures for the year ending 6th April 2023

Income: £1,109,664.00

This is the bread and butter income and is the weekly Offertory Collections £931.k


£178.6k HMRC Gift Aid raised against those contributions.

Additional income to parishes is by way of second collections and donations, fundraising, stipends and stole fees, grants and legacies none of which can be relied upon as basic income.

Expenditure: £2,502,408.00

This is basic Diocesan Central Services (Curia) and consolidated Parish Expenditure.

Some analysis, explanation & Notes:

Repairs and maintenance -£412.1k i.e. buildings costs across the Diocese including works on Bishop's House.

Active & Retired Clergy —£368.7k annual personal allowances, ongoing formation. Active clergy costs are paid by their parishes, retired clergy from central funds.

Professional Fees £206.9k – Property & Architect, Solicitor, Auditor, Accountant

Pastoral Support - £26k University Chaplaincy

Commissions Employees –£146.7k Safeguarding, Education, Marriage & Family Life, Music. The work of the commissions' members is freely given.

Bank charges £13k – consolidation of all the accounts held by the diocese.

Worship costs –£216.5k Parish and Diocesan Liturgy including St. Winefride's Shrine/Well.

Apostolic Works £35k – including Pastoral, catechetical and formation resources.

Other support costs –

Parish payroll £66.2k; Central Services Payroll £105.3; Parish Offices' running costs £83.6k; Levies unallocated £223.8k

Around and About in the Diocese

Diocesan Levies on parishes

The components of the Diocesan Levy are those areas of expenditure, to which the lay faithful of the whole Diocese have a responsibility to contribute. There is, in fact, no other income stream to pay for them.

The amount levied in any year is the actual expenditure of the previous year; thus the income to Central Service always lags behind the expenditure by one fiscal year. There can be a natural fluctuation each year, but it would be fair and obvious to say that as the cost of living and salaries rise each year the levy will too.

The amount levied on each parish is a percentage of the sum of the Offertory Collection and Gift Aid. If a parish does not make a Gift Aid claim in one year, or accumulates a couple of Gift Aid claims, that will lower or raise their total income sum which in turn will affect the levy figure, but not the percentage contribution. Over the last couple of years this has remained around 37%. This means that those parishes which have a greater annualised weekly Offertory Collection income will be levied for a greater sum, but only ever the same percentage as those parishes that have a lesser income.

The sum used to calculate the 2022/23 Levies was the actual spend figures for 2021/22 which totalled at £377.5k

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS AND WELSH GOVERNMENT

For over forty years Our Lady's School, Bangor (Ysgol Ein Harglwyddes) has been classified as the Diocese's top priority school to be due for a new building. Last month it was announced that the Welsh Government had approved the scheme from Gwynedd Council to build on a new site at the total cost of nearly £8 million. The Diocese is to contribute around £1.2m.

After nearly one hundred and fifty years of providing Catholic education in Bangor in the existing buildings, new opportunities and resources will become available for one of the most diverse Catholic communities in the Diocese. Bishop Peter is delighted and grateful to all concerned who have worked to begin and create a new chapter in the life of Bangor and Caernarfon Parish.

At the same time and in separate arrangements the Welsh Government has awarded grants of nearly £1.5m to the three Wrexham schools (St. Mary's, St. Anne's, and St. Joseph's Catholic & Anglican High School), for essential repairs and maintenance works. No Diocesan contribution is required for these three projects.

DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE VICTIMS & SURVIVORS OF SEXUAL ABUSE

This is an annual day called for by Pope Francis and chosen by the Bishops of England and Wales to be observed on Tuesday of the Fifth Week of Easter. In June last year Bishop Peter inaugurated St. Winefride's Shine and Well as a place of prayer and healing for the victims of sexual harassment, abuse and violence. Drawing on the story of Winefride, who was a teenage victim of sexual harassment and violence and who found healing and new life in the actions of her uncle, the priest Beuno, the Shrine is offered as a place of healing, hope, peace and forgiveness for all

those whose lives are blighted by the outrage of sexual attack of any kind.

The Shrine is open throughout the day (10.00a.m. to 4.00p.m.) and there will be short services at 12noon and again at 3 o'clock to pray with and for those lives have been affected by sexual abuse.

We are all invited to reflect and pray this day (Tuesday 30th April) for the victims and survivors of sexual abuse.
