### THE SEASON OF CREATION 2023 'Let peace and justice

*flow'* Each year from September 1 to October 4, the Christian family unites for this worldwide celebration of prayer and action to protect our common home. This year, the theme for the season is "Let justice and peace flow". The Season of Creation begins 1<sup>st</sup> September on the World Day of Prayer for Care of Creation through to 4<sup>th</sup> October, the Feast Day of St Francis of Assisi. Ways in which we can take part will be advertised in next week's Newsletter.

THE JOY OF FAITH IN CHRIST. Pope Francis is the pope of relationships. They were the subject of his encyclical Fratelli Tutti – probably the first papal document to urge people to smile at one another – and this thread ran through what he said at World Youth Day in Lisbon held recently, possibly the largest gathering of people in Portuguese history. The lens through which Francis sees relationships is the essential Christian one: in Jesus Christ, through Jesus Christ, by Jesus Christ. This may be why Lisbon was such a success. It was buzzing with joy; it was open; it was personal; it was Christ-centred. Francis did not beat the drum for Church teaching, as some of his predecessors did. If he had an implicit message on that score, it was not to let doctrine stand in the way of a loving personal encounter. With each other, with Christ: it was an allembracing message, excluding nobody. This approach, of seeing Christ in others and in oneself, struck a chord with the million and a half young people who soaked up the Pope's words. He seemed at ease with them and they with him. Although even this number is hardly representative of a Church a thousand times larger, this selection of young people were witnesses to a particular, but also universal, truth, Jesus Christ is magnetically attractive. The story of his life is attractive in all its mystery, tragedy and glory; his speeches and parables are as attractive as they are relevant. The Church only exists to introduce Christ into the lives of others, so why not let Christ do that himself? The more one hears his words, the more one knows him. He is the foremost evangelizer; and through him the laity can be empowered to evangelize too, their lives transformed by his presence within. Young Catholics like those at Lisbon are the Church's future, and those who shared and experienced their energy and love came away feeling cherished, enriched and emboldened. They are the perfect therapy for the hopelessness and fatigue that can infect any ancient organization. Lisbon's gift was to lift the Church's morale, to make all things seem possible once more. It was the gift of Francis and the young people; and, seen with the eyes of faith, it was the gift of Christ himself. (from The Tablet).

# Below is a brief summary from two of our parishioners from St Mary's Church - Rebekah Fleming and Paige Hudson-Jones sharing their experience of World Youth Day 2023.

When asked on how our experience of the Lisbon World Youth Day was, in short we would say; encouraging, inspirational, difficult and overwhelming at times, but set a better foundation in faith for ourselves and energized us for thinking about the future of our own parish.

Picture this, it's Saturday and the evening is drawing in, bringing with it a well welcomed breeze. The day had reached an outrageous 37 degrees (but not as outrageous as the next day which surpassed 40 degrees) in which we walked several hours in the midday sun.

Around us, nearly 1.5 million people lie, sit or stand in anticipation for The Pope's final messages to us. People chant "Esta es la juventud del Papa!" - Spanish for "This is the Pope's Youth!", and the WYD theme song is played *almost* a little bit too much.

Throughout this week, The Pope has brought messages of inspiration and openness, a refreshing call to faith that is based on inclusivity and compassion for all, especially those who have been marginalised and historically those who have not felt welcomed by or found a home in the church. This is beautifully illustrated when in The Pope's opening speech, he said "En la Iglesia hay espacio para todos" - "There is room for everyone in the church", and we all organically repeated after him "todos todos todos", "everyone everyone everyone".

This compassion and inclusivity should be the only possible outcome of following truly the joy and love that Jesus spoke of throughout his preachings and that our church is based upon. Crucial to all of this, is of course, friendships and social bonds. This week was an incredible coming together of cultures and backgrounds, from all over the world, brought together as one faith community. The relationships with those around us enriched our experience and knowledge through conversation, prayer and song, and was often an important addition to the preachings of various bishops and priests, that sometimes needed greater discussion and the chance to share our own opinions and outlooks.

The Pope spoke to us about God's call for us to renew the faith in the church and how this can't just happen inside the four walls of a church, but truly living out what it means to be followers of Christ; as one Bishop said last week, "We must be the Gospel on our own two legs". A faith community is not an insular existence, but rather an active and loving one, working towards social justice enacted within our local communities and beyond.

We must now ask, what do we do when we leave such a lively and energised space, where everyone was so joyful about their faith? How do we turn this enthusiasm and energy into actively living out of the message of Jesus in our own communities at home?

How can we bring healing and renewal into our faith communities that for the past two decades, have been struggling with numbers, and wondering what our place is in this changing world? And how can we best serve our local community?

At the conclusion of the final Mass for World Youth Day, Pope Francis expressed his deep gratitude for every person who made "this grace-filled event" possible and announced Seoul, South Korea as the next location for World Youth Day in 2027.
